Multicultural Night, City of Duluth, GA

Detailed description of the event

Multicultural Night celebrated the vibrant diversity of our community through music, dance, art, and food, offering attendees a joyful and immersive experience. The event brought together people from all walks of life, creating a dynamic space that embraced and honored the rich tapestry of cultures in our community. The evening came alive with a dynamic lineup of cultural performances hosted by the lively DJ Jessica It's All Good. The main stage showcased acts spanning traditional and contemporary styles, including the passionate rhythms of Berdolé Flamenco, the high-energy Southern Pearls of Atlanta Step Dance, the intricate grace of Classical Indian Dance, the lively footwork of Carpenter School of Irish Dance, the mesmerizing movements of Mahealani's Polynesian Dance, the vibrant Chinese Dragon Dance, and the dazzling spectacle of Bollywood Dance. Each performance celebrated the depth and beauty of global traditions, inviting attendees to experience the richness of cultures through music and movement. In Parsons Alley, the festive sounds of Mariachi Mexico blended traditional Mexican melodies with popular favorites that crossed cultural boundaries. Jake and Joonie's Henna attracted steady crowds with their intricate traditional designs, showcasing a beloved art form celebrated across cultures. Interactive stations provided hands-on opportunities to connect with traditions, including step lessons from the Southern Pearls and a Polynesian cultural station featuring traditional instruments, tools, and artifacts. These experiences allowed quests to engage directly with diverse customs, fostering appreciation and understanding. The Town Green gazebo sparkled with a stunning display of colorful lanterns designed by community members during a workshop earlier in the week. Participants created lanterns reflecting their cultural heritage or embracing a multicultural theme, using stickers, symbols, and decorations. Many incorporated personal drawings or printed images to highlight meaningful cultural aspects. The lanterns featured designs such as Irish flags, Black history icons, Indian art, and Korean symbols. Around the gazebo, diverse skin-toned handprints and paper cutouts adorned the columns, with many attendees adding their names to symbolize unity and inclusion. A nearby world map invited attendees to mark their ancestral origins with push pins, which by evening's end showcased the incredible diversity of the community, with flags spanning every continent. Food trucks offered a culinary journey around the globe, serving dishes from Hawaii, Vietnam, Jamaica, Argentina, Mexico, Hungary, and more. Attendees sampled an array of flavors, transforming every bite into a celebration of culture. Vendors further enriched the event by showcasing handmade crafts, multicultural literature, and youth advocacy resources. At the Gigglebark Tree, Miss Luvdrop captivated audiences with multicultural stories that celebrated shared humanity and traditions. Nearby, the lantern-making tent provided over 1,000 lantern kits, where volunteers helped participants craft unique lanterns inspired by cultural elements from China, Mexico, the United States, and beyond. The night concluded with a breathtaking Lantern Parade, led by a live salsa band, stilt walkers, and a glowing 20-foot-wide peacock that illuminated the night. Nearly 1,000 participants carried their hand-decorated lanterns, each symbolizing a personal story and the collective spirit of the community. The parade was a dazzling display of light, color, and unity, as attendees marched together in celebration of diversity and togetherness. Multicultural Night was more than an event-it was a meaningful experience that encouraged attendees to learn, celebrate, and connect through the expressions of diverse cultures. This gathering beautifully reflected the richness of our community, fostering unity, mutual appreciation, and lasting memories for all who attended.


Detailed description of the DEI impact of the event/initiative



Similarly, the gazebo, adorned with lanterns, handprints, and names, symbolized the event's core message: that every individual contributes to the shared fabric of the community. By hosting multicultural vendors and food trucks, the event supported small businesses, elevated underrepresented voices, and exposed attendees to new global flavors and crafts. The Lantern Parade served as a stunning culmination of the event's DEI impact, with nearly 1,000 participants marching under the glow of their decorated lanterns. This shared experience symbolized unity, demonstrating how diversity and individuality can come together to create something extraordinary. Multicultural Night went beyond celebration to foster real connections, mutual respect, and shared understanding among attendees. 












Preplanning Action To Sustain 2024:

- 1. Contract and brainstorm with Liquid Sky:
 - a. Parade: focus on cultures not represented on stage or by vendors.
- 2. Eventeny applications to open by the start of June; vendor approval 2 weeks later.
- 3. Lantern Design On-Site:
 - a. Discuss theme and supplies with SKA
 - b. Order supplies (depending on budget, half ordered early in year so they cans start design and half ordered in new fiscal year.)
 - c. Make copies of designs as needed.
 - d. Assist as needed. (This was the first year they asked us to help cut out. Due to time constraints we were not able to provide much help. Remind SKA to keep in mind these requests must be confirmed when designs are finalized.)
 - e. Confirm the number of premade and onsite lanterns to be made.
- 4. Community Art Project: (August 22)
 - a. Design Eventeny tickets and advertise.
 - b. Purchase supplies
 - c. Print clip Art to be used
 - d. Make examples and schedule staff.
 - e. Description: At this workshop, you'll create a lantern to be carried in our lantern parade or featured in our community art project during Multicultural Night on August 24th, from 6-9 PM. Your finished lantern will be part of a beautiful display located at the gazebo near 6S Brewing. If you'd like your lantern returned after the event, we'll provide instructions on how to include your email address inside the lantern. Please note, while we will make every effort to return lanterns to those who request it, we cannot guarantee returns due to the outdoor nature of the event.

You're encouraged to design your lantern to reflect your cultural heritage, or you can opt for a general multicultural theme. We'll provide a variety of

stickers, printed cultural symbols, and other décor for you to use. While we've carefully curated a selection representing diverse cultures, feel free to bring your own drawn or printed pictures or text that highlight any specific cultural aspects you'd like to include. The workshop will take place at the Duluth Festival Center, located at 3142 Hill Street. Free parking is available at the parking deck at the Courtyard by Marriott, just across the street. The Festival Center doors will open at 6 PM, and you are welcome to join us anytime between 6 PM and 8:30 PM. Please be aware that there could be a short wait for those who join us later in the evening. We recommend allowing 20-40 minutes to craft your lantern, and if supplies are available, you may even create more than one. We look forward to seeing you there! All Art Month classes are offered at a discounted rate, subsidized by the City of Duluth's Art Month. Value of course: \$10/person***
