#### **Green Initiative**

Lazy Daze Arts and Crafts Festival, Cary, NC

#### **Detailed description of the event**

Lazy Daze Arts & Crafts Festival is a 2-day festival in the heart of Downtown Cary, NC celebrating its 49th anniversary which boasts over 250 artist booths, 28 food vendors, 15 non-profit organizations, all-day entertainment, children's programs, and interactive experiences throughout the festival.

Detailed description of the environmental impact of the event or initiative.

After a successful pilot at the 2024 Spring Daze Festival, the Cary Art Daze Low Waste Initiative was fully introduced at the 2024 Lazy Daze Arts and Crafts Festival! The initiative required all participating food vendors to use BPI-certified compostable serviceware. This included plates, clamshell containers, boxes, cups, and straws-essentially, anything leaving a vendor's truck (that wasn't recyclable) had to be compostable. Understanding that change can be difficult and and to promote vendor buy-in, Cary provided compostable cutlery for all food vendors at no cost as well as cups for the beer vendors. The process began well before the festival, with an orientation for all food vendors. This session detailed the serviceware requirements, explained what BPI certification entails, and provided resources for sourcing compliant products. Festival staff worked closely with vendors, collecting and approving every item they intended to use, and documenting these in an interactive Google sheet accessible to all vendors. At the festival, expansive composting infrastructure was strategically placed to ensure easy access. Each of the 60 Clearstream waste stations included bins for trash, recycling, and composting. Additionally, two waste information booths and a Cary Composts booth, staffed by the Town of Cary's Solid Waste Department, offered festival goers guidance on proper waste disposal. These stations included bins for trash, recycling, compost, and a special bin showcasing the serviceware used by the vendors. The the conclusion of the festival, compost was picked up by CompostNow, which collected and processed the material. By the end of the two-day event, over 4,000 pounds of compostable material were collected—an amount that impressively surpassed the weight of trash generated during the festival! This initiative was met with overwhelmingly positive feedback from both food vendors and attendees. Vendors appreciated the clear communication and support, while festival goers embraced the opportunity to contribute to a more sustainable Lazy Daze experience. By prioritizing compostable serviceware, the festival took a significant step toward reducing waste and setting a new standard for environmentally conscious events.

#### Detailed description of the DEI impact of the event/initiative

Multicultural Night created an immersive space to celebrate and honor the many cultures represented within our community. By highlighting diversity through music, dance, art, food, and interactive activities, the event offered individuals from all backgrounds a chance to feel seen, valued, and included. Main stage performances showcased rich cultural heritages to a wide audience, blending entertainment with education to foster understanding and break down barriers. Interactive experiences, such as the Polynesian cultural station and step dance lessons, provided attendees hands-on opportunities to engage with traditions outside their own. Lantern-making activities encouraged participants to express their cultural heritage or celebrate multicultural themes, fostering both pride and mutual appreciation. The world map, where attendees marked their places of ancestry, visually demonstrated the global roots of the community, emphasizing the richness brought by diverse stories. Similarly, the gazebo, adorned with lanterns, handprints, and names, symbolized the event's core message: that every individual contributes to the shared fabric of the community. By hosting multicultural vendors and food trucks, the event supported small businesses, elevated underrepresented voices, and exposed attendees to new global flavors and crafts. The Lantern Parade served as a stunning culmination of the event's DEI impact, with nearly 1,000 participants marching under the glow of their decorated lanterns. This shared experience symbolized unity, demonstrating how diversity and individuality can come together to create something extraordinary. Multicultural Night went beyond celebration to foster real connections, mutual respect, and shared understanding among attendees. Through representation, educational opportunities, and shared experiences, the event advanced diversity, equity, and inclusion in a meaningful and lasting way.

All the steps you need to know to keep Food Vendors on track & following the Low Waste Requirement at Spring Daze!



## LOW WASTE OVERVIEW

#### Vendors are required to:

- Use BPI-Certified Service ware ONLY.
- Send ALL items to staff and have each one approved before purchasing.
- Be audited at the festival.

\*Failure to adhere to this requirement results in unfavorable applications going forward.

# BACKGROUND





- Vendors complied at 95%.
- The top 'surprise item' was plastic 2oz sauce cups.
- Collected over 4,000 pounds of compostable material.
- Waste stations, food trucks, and clearstreams all had compost signage.

#### Serviceware

Includes ALL:

- Cups, lids, straws
- Containers, trays
- Sauce cups, bags, stickers, misc. items
- Napkins (already accepted)
- Cutlery (provided by TOC)





# EDUCATE VENDORS

After introducing yourself, the requirement, & why it's in place...

#### Vendors need to know:

- What counts as serviceware?
- When is the cutlery order due?
- When are items due?
- Does it have to be BPI-Certified?
- What is the event attendance?
- Are napkins compostable?
- Can I bring sauce packets?

\*Except for due dates, all questions are answered in these slides.



## COMPOSTABLE CUTLERY

#### **Cutlery Numbers**

All vendors must report the amount of BPI-Certified cutlery they need for the event.

Record their needs until all vendors answer and then place order (with extras!)

### **Event Population**

Spring Daze receives up to 15,000 attendees. Vendors need to know this to determine amounts.



### Prepare

After the order arrives at Town Hall prior to Spring Daze, the boxes will need to be labeled and/or separated into bags for the amount each vendor requested.

## Delivery

The cutlery will be delivered to each vendor the morning of Spring Daze NO LATER THAN 8:45 AM.



## IS IT BPI-CERTIFIED?

#### YES

This item is great!

If not already on the preapproved serviceware google doc, add it now. Save this item to this vendor.

#### NO

This item will NOT be allowed at the event.

The only exceptions are: napkins, bags, & trays that are only made out of 100% paper.

#### WHERE TO PUT APPROVED ITEMS

#### With Vendor's Info

Wherever you keep the vendor's information, save all items that have been approved for them.



#### Food Truck & Waste Station Materials

- Each food truck has a sign that displays product images so guests can see what to compost from each booth.
- Waste Stations have a printed guide with images of EVERY service ware item.



#### Pre-Approved List

The google doc contains all preapproved items from vendors. They MUST send all items to be approved, not just purchase from this list.



#### **Audit Checklist**

Each vendor should have ALL approved items in the audit checklist for the day of the festival.

None of these signs need to be laminated! They should be composted after.



## THE AUDIT



#### Verify

- All items should be put in a checklist BEFORE the event with room for notes & unexpected items.
- If items don't match, decide how to mitigate contamination with the vendor. (verbal or removal)

#### Deliver

Deliver ONE of each kind of item (many vendors use the same items) to EACH waste station.

## AFTER THE FESTIVAL
